#### The Armistice 1918 – 2018

Sunday the 11th November 2018 will mark the Centenary of the Armistice which ended the First World War in 1918. I pray we will all see this anniversary on the 11/11/2018 as full of significance, as our church is full of war memorials from St. Andrew's, Christ Church and St. Aidan's, so many young men served and died. I pay tribute to all those young men who came from every class and creed, from this land and many others who fought and died in both WW1 and WW2.

Many soldiers carried a small testament in their uniform pocket provided by the Church Army, YMCA or Scripture Gift Mission. Many had an Active Service text of St. John's Gospel and in some cases the testament actually saved the soldiers life, acting as a shield, embedding the bullets. 'Jesus Truly Saves'.

Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. (John Chp15. V13)

Their fight is over but our fight continues. Our fight is not a physical one, it is spiritual.

Faith in God with Prayer - Inspiration by The Holy Spirit - Generosity to others Humility to God and fellow humanity - Trust in Jesus Christ and in the Bible.

We are all called into the mission and ministry of God's Church, we are called to reach out to the community in mission and service. Standing against poverty, alcohol and substance addiction, against abuse, gambling, hatred and violence, showing God's Love, as God has shown his love to us. We must all strive to get this Gospel message out, along with Bishop Alan, Revd Bobbie and Canon Ken, acting in tangible ways that shows God's grace and love. Jesus died on the Cross of Calvary, Jesus saved the entire world and he still saves us today. #### The Irish on the Somme.

At 7.30am on July 1, 1916, some 60,000 men climbed out of their trenches and walked across No-Man's-Land and into the history books. The Battle of the Somme, was to rage for another four-and-a-half months, would ultimately involve every Irish Battalion on the Western Front. For some, such as the 36th Ulster Division which sustained some, 5,000 casualties in just 24 hours, the slaughter left them so weakened that they had to be withdrawn. For others their participation went on for weeks until attrition wore them down.

Today the Somme is at peace, though the First World War hasn't been forgotten. Dotted across its tranquil landscape are memorials to the Irish Dead, many of whom lie in the cemeteries clustered around the old front lines. Men of Ireland, North and South, unionist and nationalist.

Soldier, rest, thy warfare o'er, Sleep the sleep that knows no breaking; Dream of fighting field no more, Day of toil and night of waiting.

Have you noticed how communication methods have changed nowadays? People don't actually talk to one another as a first choice in conversing — they text, or WhatsApp or, as a last resort, email. The former two can be done on their mobiles at high speed and they can be doing something else at the same time. Sometimes I get involved in an exchange of text messages and I feel like screaming, "Why not just phone me so we can talk about this?"

I think I know why this happens; it's because many people's lives are lived at such a high speed that they must always be doing two, or several things, at one time. Example! How often do you see people carrying a polystyrene coffee cup? 'Coffee to Go' is now huge business' — as is food 'to go'! Doesn't anyone actually sit down to take lunch anymore (other than while they are texting on their phone or working on their ipad!?

Where am I going with this? Well I've been challenged in my own life by an increasing habit — 'Prayer to Go'. I talk to God when I'm driving, when I'm walking, when I'm working in the garden, when I'm trying to get to sleep — and on numerous other occasions. Now I'm not suggesting that God doesn't hear such prayers — but what happens when He is trying to communicate his heart to us? You see that requires our full attention, our complete focus, an open mind in which he can impart his will and purposes - in other words a dedicated time set apart for him.

A man came home from a long day at work; he was totally exhausted. He went into his son's bedroom to wish him goodnight, and was greatly irritated when his little boy began to badger him about money. The little boy said, "Daddy, how much money do you make?" The father grunted, "Enough!" But the boy pressed further and said, "I mean how much do you make per hour?" The man was not in the mood for any games, so he gave the boy a quick lecture and said, "They pay me £20 per hour." The boy then said, "Can I borrow £8?" The father screamed out, "No! Now go to sleep!"

The following morning the overworked man felt very guilty about the way he treated his son, so he apologised to him and gave him the  $\mathfrak{L}8$ . The little boy's eyes lit up like a Christmas tree and he ran to his room. In seconds he returned with his little piggy bank and spilled its contents on the kitchen table. The man watched curiously as his son excitedly pushed all the contents toward him. The boy then reached into his pocket for the  $\mathfrak{L}8$  his Dad had given him and said, "Daddy, here's  $\mathfrak{L}20$ , can I buy an hour of your time?"

Do you see where this is going? That little boy wanted to spend time with his dad, so badly that he was willing to pay for it. Well, our Heavenly Father wants us to spend time with us so too - and He has paid for it as well. He sent His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, to remove every barrier, tear down every wall, bridge every gulf, unlock every door, that we might have a personal relationship with Him. Now He wants to spend quality time with us in which he can pour his love and grace into our lives and guide us in our walk with Him.

But it's difficult if He only gets 'Prayer to go' time! What does He have to do to get our prime time?
