DAILY PRAYER POINTS – PUSH (Pray Until Something Happens!)

One helpful structure for prayer is given by the acronym "ACTS", representing adoration, confession, thanksgiving and supplication (or intercession). *Adoration* is to adore God, to worship him and to fulfil the commandment to love him with all of our heart, mind and soul.

Many of the psalms will help us. *Confession* allows us to clear away the things in the relationship between us and God which are displeasing to Him. All of us have sinned.

Thanksgiving. From childhood we are brought up to say "Thank You" when someone does something for us, or gives us a gift. Each moment God is blessing us, every minute we can recall the wonderful things that God has done for us, and the gifts that we have been given.

Supplication or Intercession. Finally we come to ask God for our needs and the needs of others. There are many demands on our prayer time - many topics and issues that we could pray for, so we need to choose, and to be specific.

Pray for others. Pray for your family members, and for neighbours and friends and the Church family. It's also good to pray for those who don't know Jesus to come to faith - many Christians have come to believe in Christ through the prayers of others.

Pray for world issues: for peace in difficult situations, for leaders and those in influential positions, especial for our local politians; for global issues such as care of God's environment, justice for the poor, relief of suffering in less developed countries, and other issues that come to you.

Pray for your own needs too. It's easy to neglect this, but Jesus encourages us to do so in the *Lord's Prayer* - the model for prayer that He gave us.

Dear Church Family,

I'm writing this on Ascension Day, the fortieth day of Easter, the time when, as recorded by Luke, 'Jesus was taken up to heaven'. (Acts 1:1). His earthly ministry complete, he left the future of the Church with his followers. He told them to be his witnesses - but only after they received the gift of the Holy Spirit, his continuing powerful presence, which would enable them to continue his work – proclaiming the Good News of salvation for all people.



St Aidan's is part of that continuing witness in this place at this time.

As I reflect on the work and witness of our parish church, the image of family is very much to the fore. We are a family, there are those who know each other well, meet regularly on a Sunday and at other times and enjoy friendship and fellowship together. Then there is the extended family, those at a distance. Perhaps reading this you fall into that category. You have a connection, but it is not a close one. It might be that you attended church as a child and have grown away from that practice, or maybe your parents or grandparents were members. However, there are times when you return — perhaps for a baptism, a wedding or a funeral. I meet many of you on those occasions. You tell me how much St Aidan's means to you and how welcome you feel when you come. It is particularly encouraging when young families come for baptism; but so disappointing when often we do not see them again until the next 'special' occasion.

With this issue of the magazine you will receive a copy of the Annual Report. In it you will see the large number of people who make up St Aidan's family, those who are on the parish list who contribute through the freewill offering system. You will find your number there and be able to see the amount of your contribution. Many of you are generous in your giving, but you will see from the financial statements that we are not making ends meet. The large number of extended family members could make an enormous difference to the life of the church by their more regular attendance and financial support.

After Ascension comes Pentecost. God by his Holy Spirit breathes life into his Church. My prayer is that we would all be willing to receive that gift so that we may continue to be his witnesses both individually and as members of St Aidan's Church Family.

OBITUARY



Reverend John Mackey 04.03.1934 - 07.05.2018

It was with deep regret that we learned of the death of the Revd. John Mackey of Crewe, England and extend our deepest sympathy to his wife Audrey and family.



John grew up in the parish of St. Aidan's. He lived in Aughrim Street with his parents Bobby and Maud and his two younger sisters Ruby and Margaret. He attended Workman Infant School across the road from where he lived, then onto Blythe Street School and finishing in Linfield Intermediate. John left school at the age of fourteen to start work in Hanna and Browne as an apprentice French Polisher and later leaving there, to go and work in the Belfast Telegraph.

John was very much involved in St. Aidan's parish life, attending church and Sunday school each week, becoming a member of the C.L.B. and joining the church choir. He was a popular young man and made many friendships that lasted long after he left these shores, in fact they lasted a lifetime.

His love of the church put him on a spiritual path and John left Sandy Row to travel to England and train as a minister. While training in England he met and married Audrey, a union that was to last fifty-five years. John and Audrey settled down into married life and had three children, Michael, Ruth and Peter.

John never forgot his roots in Sandy Row or the love he had for St. Aidan's. Returning home on his many visits to see his family, he liked nothing better than walking up Blythe Street to St. Aidan's and sharing in the fellowship with family and friends and occasionally preaching as well.

He loved to travel and organised many church trips to the Holy Land and Rome, taking a special delight in seeing the places and cultures he had only read and talked about on a Sunday. He also enjoyed the great holidays he and Audrey spent with their sons who were living in the Far East, travelling to Thailand, Hong Kong and China. John retired from the Ministry in the year 2000, his last parish was St. Michael's in Coppenhall, Crewe. When retired he became interested in studying his family tree. Through doing this, Audrey and him were able to travel to Canada and the United States and join in a big reunion of the Mackey family, meeting relatives they had never known.

The last years of Johns life were overshadowed with ill health but he still retained that spark and love of life and involved himself in as many things as he physically could, enjoying day trips out with Audrey, family and friends. John touched many lives in his lifetime, his life as a minister brought him into contact with many people. John was a loving husband, father, grand-father, great grand-father, brother, uncle, cousin and friend. Sadly, John died on the 7th May.

He will be very much missed by all who knew him.

A WORD FROM CANON KEN

My eight year old grandson can't understand why I keep saying that Spring is my favourite season. "But Grandad", he said, "the weather's better in the summer and in all those weeks off school I can do stuff!"

And it's certainly difficult to argue with that. He doesn't understand about deadness in the garden and in the fields giving way to new growth, and even if he did – so what? But maybe someday, when he too is an old man,

he'll appreciate how my spirit surges when I see a plant or shrub that is clearly dead, parts of it already rotting in the soil perhaps, suddenly produce new fresh shoots of foliage. It's hard to believe but as the next few days come and go there are more shoots, some of them already opening up with promise for the summer season around the corner.

Not exactly a riveting concept for a child but for the rest of us it is an annual reminder of how God renews the earth with His seasonal activity. He brings forth new life from deadness.

But it's also his purpose for our lives as well - and I don't just mean the resurrection to eternal life for every believer (though that's powerful enough!), but God renews us every-time we bring our 'deadness' to him and ask for his touch in our lives; the deadness of unconfessed sin, the deadness we experience when we neglect our prayer life and worship, the deadness of spiritual apathy, the deadness of wrong attitudes, the deadness brought about by worry, sorrow and fear, by poor health – the things that sap up our spiritual energy and make us feel empty inside – and we no longer feel alive. Recognise that feeling?

Well it's Spring! In fact it can be Spring any day of the year when you bring your despair and despairing circumstances to God.

Allow him to work in you and in your circumstances - and look for signs of renewal, of new hope and a new life. It's how God works. He brings new life out of deadness.
