

A suggested pattern for prayer during the week. Please use the magazine with the weekly pew sheet to focus your parish prayers and news reports to pray for the world.

Tuesday: Choose one item from the news headlines and bring that situation to God in prayer.

Wednesday: Pray for young people and leaders involved in Children's Church, Messy Church, Girls' Brigade and remember Alison Shaw, Family Worker.

Thursday: Pray for members of the Select Vestry, Church Wardens, and all who give their time to various church activities.

Friday: Pray for brothers and sisters in Christ who are being persecuted because of their faith. Look at the Open Doors website for up to date information.

Saturday: Pray for Sunday Services, for Revd Bobbie, Canon Ken, John, Organists Edna and Gerald and the Choir that our worship may glorify God and bind us together as members of God's family. Pray that St Aidan's will be a beacon of light in the community and a place of welcome and acceptance.

Sunday: Pray together in God's house if possible.

THE ARMISTICE 1918 - 2018

The 11th November, 2018 marked the Centenary of the Armistice which ended the First World War.

A decision was made that all bodies of the fallen should be buried where they fell and not brought home. As only the wealthy could have afforded to bring their loved ones home it was only right that no difference should be made between the rank, class or creed of the fallen.

Many bodies were never recovered and relatives at home had no grave to visit to grieve or couldn't afford to travel to the grave sites. It was in response to this that the idea of the Cenotaph Memorial and Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was born.

The idea of such a burial seems first to have come to a chaplain at the Front, the Reverend David Railton (1884-1955), when he noticed in 1916 in a back garden at Armentieres, a grave with a rough cross on which were pencilled the words, "An Unknown British Soldier". It grieved him when he thought of the family of the young man and of many others who had no known grave. He wrote to the Dean of Westminster, Herbert Ryle, through whose energies this memorial was carried into effect.

TOMB OF THE UNKNOWN SOLDIER

At the west end of the knave of Westminster Abbey is the grave of the Unknown Warrior, whose body was brought from France to be buried there on 11th November 1920. The grave which contains soil from France, is covered by a slab of black Belgian marble from a quarry near Namur. On it is the following inscription, composed by Herbert Ryle, Dean of Westminster.

OF A BRITISH WARRIOR
UNKNOWN BY NAME OR RANK
BROUGHT FROM FRANCE TO LIE AMONG
THE MOST ILLUSTRIOUS OF THE LAND
AND BURIED HERE ON ARMISTICE DAY
11 NOV: 1920, IN THE PRESENCE OF
HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE V
HIS MINISTERS OF STATE
THE CHIEFS OF HIS FORCES
AND A VAST CONCOURSE OF THE
NATION

THUS ARE COMMEMORATED THE MANY
MULTITUDES WHO DURING THE GREAT
WAR OF 1914-1918 GAVE THE MOST THAT
MAN CAN GIVE LIFE ITSELF
FOR GOD
FOR KING AND COUNTRY

FOR THE SACRED CAUSE OF JUSTICE
AND
THE FREEDOM OF THE WORLD
THEY BURIED HIM AMONG THE KINGS
BECAUSE HE
HAD DONE GOOD TOWARD GOD AND
TOWARD
HIS HOUSE
Around the main inscription are four texts:
(Top) THE LORD KNOWETH THEM THAT
ARE HIS,
(Sides) GREATER LOVE HATH NO MAN

FOR LOVED ONES HOME AND EMPIRE

THAN THIS....
UNKNOWN AND YET WELL KNOWN,
DYING AND BEHOLD WE LIVE,
(Base) IN CHRIST SHALL ALL BE MADE
ALIVE.
