What a friend we have in Jesus. Church Hymnal 627. Thursday: Pray for wisdom for members of the Select Vestry as they make important decisions about the fabric and finances of the parish. Give thanks for all involved in many and varied activities; the Church Wardens, those who volunteer in the Thrift Shop, the flower arrangers, the counting team, the tea-makers. *Teach me my God and King in all things Thee to see and what I do in anything, to do it as for Thee. Church Hymnal 601.*

Friday: Pray for peace in this troubled world. Use the news headlines to focus your prayer. *Make me a channel of your peace. Church Hymnal 503.*

Saturday: Pray for Sunday Services, for Revd Bobbie, Canon Ken, John, and the Choir that our worship may glorify God and bind us together as members of God's family. Remember organists Gerald and Edna. *Bind us together Lord with cords which cannot be broken. Church Hymnal 518.*

Sunday: If you are not able to be in church, take time to turn to God, to read his word. Pray for brothers and sisters in Christ who are being persecuted for their faith and do not have the freedom to gather for worship. *Jesus stand among us in your risen power; let this time of worship be a hallowed hour. Church Hymnal 338.*



Dear Friends,

We often think of January as a time of new beginnings, a fresh start as the old year ends and a new one begins. In the church calendar Advent, usually in December, marks a new year when one cycle of readings and



festivals end and a new one begins. However as I write I'm thinking of the new beginnings which occur at this time of year. Summer is over and a new school term will see little ones having their first taste of school life, while at the other end of the scale those whose school days are over will be starting out on a new way of life. This issue of the parish magazine contains details of organisations returning to their usual weekly or monthly slot with fresh energy and a new programme for the year ahead.

The most exciting 'new beginning' for us in St Aidan's is the preparation for the celebration of 125 years of being church here in Sandy Row. The anniversary takes place in March next year and we have chosen the theme **BACK TO THE FUTURE** to help focus our thinking and planning as we seek to continue to *'Enable people to have a living faith in a loving God by serving Christ in the Community'.*

In 2015 we celebrated 120 years – looking back to the foundation of the church and its witness over the years. In a new and very different context the challenge of being church requires fresh thinking and new ways of doing things. For some time the Select Vestry has been considering how to make the best use of our buildings. We are blessed with a beautiful, well maintained church building which no longer needs to facilitate huge congregations on a regular basis. We have a large parish hall in a poor state of repair which is not fit for purpose. The cost of re-furbishing the hall has proved not to be viable, leaving the only option to sell the hall and re-order the church building to provide both a worship space and accommodation for all parish activities with full disabled access. It will take time for this to be accomplished so in the meantime the hall will continue to be available for at least the next two years. Plans for the future will also include a celebration of the historic place of the parish hall within the community down through the years.

Thinking of these 'new beginnings', I am reminded of the importance of prayer as we move forward together in God's mission. The Apostle Paul writes: Be cheerful no matter what; pray all the time; thank God no matter what happens. This is the way God wants you who belong to Christ Jesus to live. 1 Thessalonians 5:17-18

In preparation for the celebration of the parish's 125th anniversary next March, we are planning a Fellowship meeting on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. The theme for the celebrations is Back to the Future, so we are starting off on 11th September at 7.45 with a showing of the film, starring Michael J. Fox and Christopher Lloyd. Marty McFly, a 17 year old high school student, is accidentally sent thirty years into the past in a time-travelling DeLorean invented by his close friend, the maverick scientist Doc Brown. REMEMBRANCE Pearls Before Poppies

The Story of The Red Cross Pearls by Rachel Trethewey

The Red Cross Pearls tells a story of a littleknown campaign. While we all associate the selling and wearing of poppies with the Red Cross, the charity kicked off its post war fundraising efforts with adornments that were a little more luxurious.

In February 1918, when the First World War was still being bitterly fought, a prominent society member Lady Northcliffe conceived an idea to help raise funds for the British Red Cross. Using her husband's newspapers, The Times and the Daily Mail, she ran a campaign to collect enough pearls to create a necklace, intending to raffle the piece to raise money for the war effort.

What began as a high society campaign however, captured the wider public imagination.

Over the next nine months 4,000 pearls poured in from around the world, enough to create 41 separate strings.

Society women everywhere donated pearls in tribute to lost brothers, husbands and sons,

while groups of women came together to raise enough to contribute one pearl on behalf of their communities. The pearls donated ranged from priceless heirlooms, even



one that had survived the sinking of the Titanic, to imperfect yet treasured trinkets. Reflecting the wide variety and quality of the pearls on offer, prices paid during the auction ranged from £22,000 for the Norbury necklace to £30 for the childrens necklaces. These along with other pearl jewels such as rings and brooches, raised the Total amount of £85,290 pounds, 12 shillings and 4d for wounded soldiers, when they were auctioned off at Christies in London on December 19th 1918.

Since the publishing of Pearls before Poppies, author Trethewey has been on a publicity campaign that included touring the country giving talks about the real life stories that inspired her book. During this, one of the original pearl necklaces auctioned at Christies, was found after its owners read about it in the Trethawey book.

The string of natural pearls had been in the same family for almost a century - a constant heirloom since it was originally purchased at Christies in 1918 and it is still kept in its original box marked with the Red Cross emblem.

The owners who wished to remain anonymous have always referred to the necklace as the Red Cross Pearls, they did not know the full history of the jewel and the fundraiser until reading Pearls before Poppies.

In a full circle moment the necklace has been sent back to Christies for valuation. The auction house has placed its value somewhere between $\pounds 100,000 - \pounds 150,000$. More than the entire total raised for the Red Cross Pearl Appeal in 1918.
